



With the closure of the Karakorum Highway in January 2010 after a devastating landslide, the activities in the Swat Valley by the Taliban and the shattering floods of September, this account of the couples travels in this remote area of Pakistan is one of the few recent accounts of travels in Pakistan. This short travelogue is ideal reading for people that love travel and travel stories.



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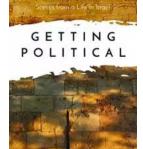
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
