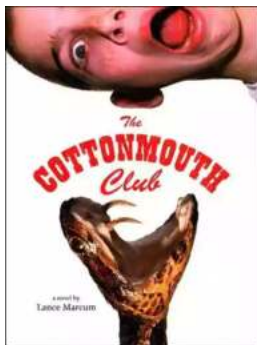
just like in any relationship between living creatures, things do not always go according to plan..

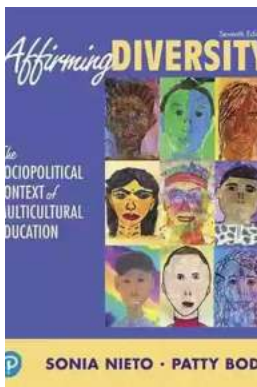
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
