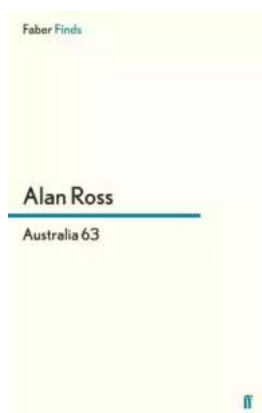

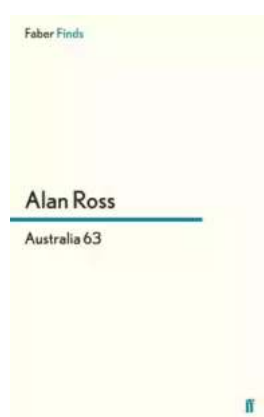

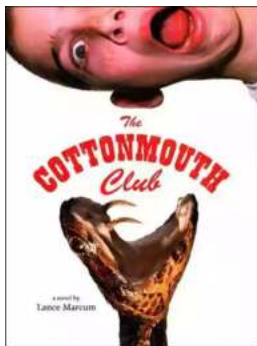
South Africa and the West Indies. In the book-length accounts he published of these tours, his lifelong love of the game found glorious expression.

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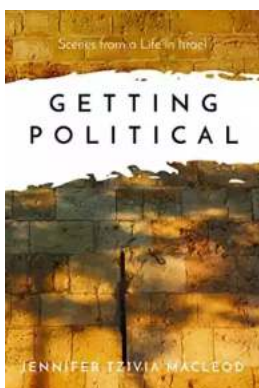
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
